PART B: LOOKING AHEAD TO 2019–2020

OUR VISION

To support the delivery of safe, effective and person-centred care which is provided, before, at and after death, to those who are at the end of life and to the bereaved, within a culture of support for staff health, wellbeing and resilience.

WHAT DO WE DO?

- Develop bereavement-related educational interventions and support to health and social care staff in Scotland
- With a particular focus on medical staff, we aim to enhance professionals' preparedness to manage care and communication around the time of death and in bereavement

WHY DO WE DO IT?

Our work is founded upon acceptance that events leading up to and surrounding death, and patients and families experience of these, will significantly influence the nature of bereavement. Therefore, optimal handling of the preparation for, and support around all deaths (including those that are expected and unexpected) by healthcare professionals is an important part of improving bereavement care in Scotland.

This report provides a summary of some of our key achievements of 2018–19, and the impact of these achievements on the national landscape of bereavement-related education and care in Scotland, and in some instances beyond.











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L | TOOLKIT OF RESOURCES

With input from a wide range of subject and clinical experts, throughout this year we have continued to develop a range of new bereavement-related training materials. The majority of these are all openly accessible on our website www.sad.scot.nhs.uk.

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
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ANIMATED FILMS

We have added six new films to our <u>suite of animations</u> which support practitioners in conversations around death, dying and bereavement. These address gaps in the availability of similar training materials. The short length and scenario-based focus of these films enhances learning and relevance within already busy clinical and educational environments.

Each film is accompanied by a downloadable leaflet of key learning points and in some cases, a guide as to how the film can be used in a group teaching scenario.

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

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

Great training resource that would be helpful to many different health and social care professionals.







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
MEDICAL CERTIFICATION OF CAUSE OF DEATH

We have continued to work in conjunction with <u>Healthcare</u> <u>Improvement Scotland's Death Certification Review</u>
<u>Service</u> (DCRS) on a variety of educational initiatives to support certifying and non-certifying staff this year.

The numbers of doctors completing the two e-Learning modules (recently launched by Healthcare Improvement Scotland/NES) has continued to rise across all Health Boards this year. The modules are designed to support certifying doctors to complete Medical Certificates of Cause of Death (MCCDs).

NES and the DCRS continue to work together to promote these modules and have recently developed an e-card which has been circulated to Health Boards.




Death Certification: Identifying Common MIstakes

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LGBT+

With support from Stonewall Scotland, the Scottish Trans Alliance and LGBT Health and Wellbeing we have developed some educational materials for professionals who may interact with LGBT+ people around the time of a death and in bereavement.

This has included the production of a handout for staff and accompanying <u>website content</u>.

Work is ongoing to establish how best to integrate these into pre-existing equality and diversity training opportunities. We are also considering further educational resource development which could incorporate the telling of patient stories, perhaps through film or animation.











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2 | NHS BOARD STRATEGIC LEADS / BEREAVEMENT COORDINATORS

We continued to support this network across Scotland this year, providing opportunity for the sharing of best practice regarding bereavement care and education on a national basis. This included hosting three learning events, which garnered good attendance and engagement. We also continue to manage an online community of practice for the group.

In total, 16 speakers were welcomed to the learning events from a wide range of organisations including Scottish Government, Scottish Partnership for Palliative Care, Stonewall Scotland, Scottish Care, Sue Ryder and Hospice UK; each delivering informative sessions and facilitating thought-provoking discussions.

Getting back to work following personal bereavement




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As a bereavement co-ordinator who works in a rural health board, it's crucial to remain linked in with colleagues from the rest of NHS Scotland... Colleagues at NES in the bereavement professional development work stream always provide a full and varied day which includes updates on national bereavement events, invited guests from a multi-professional world that can inform our professional practice as bereavement co-ordinators and bereavement leads within our health boards... As a peer group we are encouraged to present pieces of work or an innovative idea we may be working on within our own health board to share with the wider. professional group. Knowing that there are colleagues across NHS Scotland involved in a similar role helps reduce the geographical mileage between us and the use of our online Community of Practice is another developing strand of support and information.



We launched a new initiative this year to support NHS Scotland Bereavement Leads to attend educational and development events, with a view to sharing learning with the wider group at future meetings.

We funded four NHS Board Bereavement Strategic Leads/ Coordinators to attend a number of other conferences this year; the learning from which will be shared amongst the network. These included events on supporting children who are bereaved and palliative and end of life care.





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SHORT TERM DEVELOPMENT FUNDING AWARD FOR NHS HEALTH BOARDS

We identified a need to further support NHS Boards to create and enhance bereavement-related developments at local level this year and thus we implemented a new award scheme.

As a result, we provided four Health Boards with small grant funding to undertake a variety of projects, including:

- Development of a community bereavement breakfast club
- Establishment of a monthly reflective group for nursing staff
- Development, delivery and evaluation of a loss, grief and bereavement education and training package for front line mortuary staff
- Establishment of a hospital-based bereavement hub in a rural community

Following evaluation, the learning from each initiative will be shared with all Health Boards across Scotland, in the hope that some pieces of work may be able to be replicated elsewhere.








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USE OF NES' SUPPORTING SCOTTISH GRIEF AND BEREAVEMENT CARE BRANDING

We have seen an increase in the use of our branding across NHS Boards this year. The thistle image (originally commissioned by NES for the national NHS Scotland When Someone has Died booklet) is being utilised more widely on bereavement related written materials and signage in a variety of different ways around Scotland; each as part of initiatives to support improvements to bereavement care.







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3 | STAFF WELLBEING


This year, we have spent time considering in more detail how caring for those who are at end of life and those who are bereaved can impact upon staff themselves.

In response, we have begun work on the production of a film which will capture the experiences of a multidisciplinary team (both clinical and non-clinical staff), who deal with death and dying on a daily basis.


We have been pleased to work with the director of two films which focus on similar themes, dealing with issues of resilience for emergency personnel who encounter death in their professional roles, within an <u>Air Ambulance</u> and <u>Mountain Rescue</u> team, throughout the preparatory work completed to date.

Liaison with Health Boards has revealed a number of acute care teams who are interested to tell their stories in this film and we look forward to the completion and launch of the video later in 2019.

We continue to consider how else we can support staff around issues of resilience and wellbeing relevant to a bereavement context.

- Learn and share best practice guidelines and research


The **Support around Death website**





PART A: SOME OF OUR 2018–2019 ACTIVITY / ACHIEVEMENTS


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- launching a bereavement national training framework for medical staff to support doctors in conversations with patients and families around the time of death and in bereavement, with a view to enhancing existing medical curricula
- continuing to develop educational resources to build a toolkit of materials to support the implementation of this framework, including a mobile app to support bereavement related communications
- hosting an annual conference to support the delivery of high-quality bereavement-related educational initiatives and encourage networking, shared learning and ultimately increase the profile of bereavement care in Scotland
- working with multi-sector partners (including third sector, NHS and social care) on new national bereavement care standards for Scotland

- developing the evidence base to demonstrate the need for improvements to bereavement education e.g. though building on the findings of our literature reviews and previous surveys of junior doctors and education providers
- facilitating national learning networks for sharing of best practice in bereavement care
- producing quarterly e-newsletters, managing online communities of practice and an active social media account
- continuing to expand and develop the <u>Support</u>
 <u>Around Death website</u>, to provide an openly accessible, educational platform for health and social care professionals to access bereavement-related training materials and information
