
Our digital legacy is what remains of us digitally once we die. When we die our digital footprint helps to inform our digital legacy.

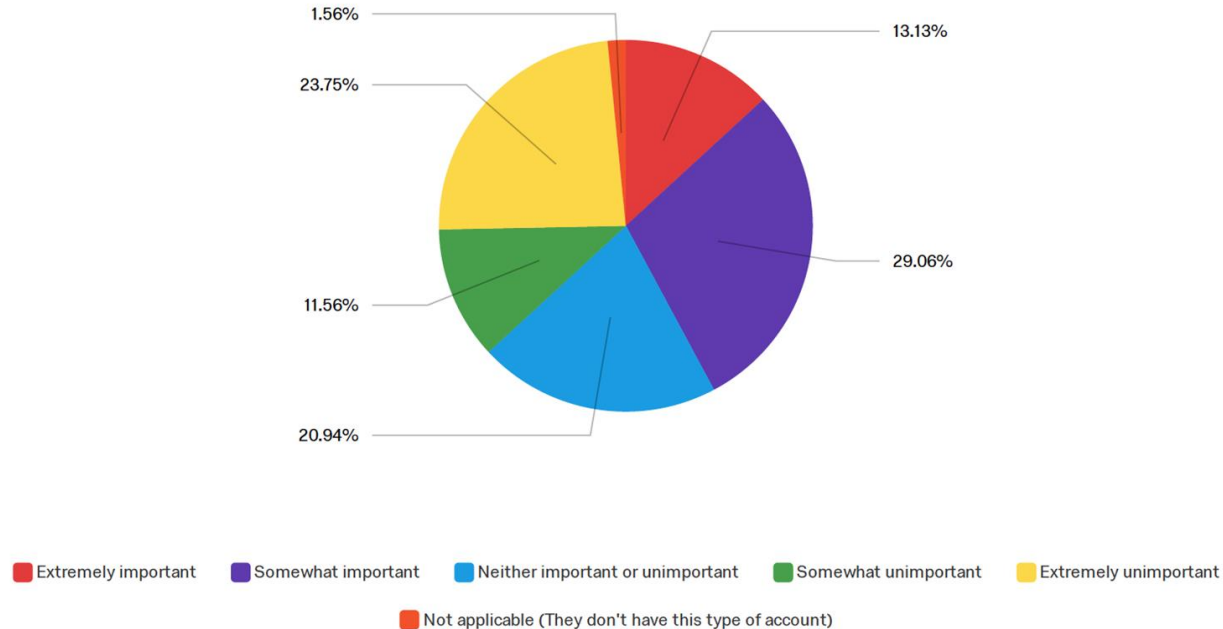
My story

Facebook is often the first place where we learn of someones death. A Facebook account of a friend or family member can soon become a resource of great comfort during the grieving process. To the amount of time we spend on Facebook it is becoming more and more important that we make plans for what we would like to happen to our own Facebook account once we have died. Funeral Directors Must Speak About "Video Streaming" When Arranging A Funeral

Published 5 October 2020

Video Streaming Best Practice Guide for Funeral Directors

- Partner with at least one self-shooter, camera person or independent filmmaker in your local area.
- Obtain a fixed costs for filming and/or streaming a funeral from at least one supplier. A markup on the costs charged by externals should not be made or placed on the bereaved.
- Ensure that all staff are aware of the costs associated with providing a video stream.
- Ensure that all staff who arrange funerals talk about 'funeral streaming' as part of your organisation's best practice and code of conduct.
- If your organisation is does not provide a funeral streaming service make sure that 'funeral streaming' is still spoken about when arranging a funeral.
- Test, test, test. Make sure that whoever is providing the video stream visits the venue and checks the connectivity (WiFi / 4G signal) prior to the ceremony. When a stable WiFi is not available 4G should be used.
- Be open and honest with mourners about the technology provided and it's limitations prior to the event. Streaming funerals will bring a number of challenges. These include the sound quality, where camera's position, the weather (when outside) etc.
- Let friends, families and those arranging their decide whether or not they would like a funeral stream to be 'public' or 'private'. Most funerals in the UK are public events.
- Learn how to arrange and stream a funeral on Facebook. Arranging a funeral on Facebook can have a much greater reach than a newspaper advert. A large number of funerals are now streamed on Facebook.

The Room Where it Happens' : An exploration of personalised Virtual Reality (VR) - bringing the home to the hospice during the COVID-19 pandemic

Virtual Reality

Virtual Reality (VR) provides a way to transport someone to a different place and time.

Harlington Hospice is exploring using VR with inpatients, including the oldest old. It has taken patients back to the street where they grew up and visit tropical places on their bucket list. These experiences have been uplifting and the feedback has provoked further exploration of the use of VR.



Person-Centred Virtual Reality

- 1) The primary goal is to provide personalised VR content to inpatients.
- 2) A secondary goal is to provide family with a means to stay connected with the patient.

*Empowering people to connect virtually, may help reduce guilt and grief caused by separation.



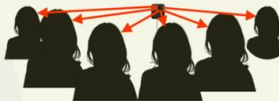
Methodology

Through play, discussion and innovation we have developed what we believe to be the first 'person-centred VR' intervention within the hospice setting.

During the advance care planning process a doctor at the hospice asks the patient 'what matters most' to them.

When it might be suitable, a 360 (GoPro) camera is offered to family or friends of the inpatient. The camera is taken away and content of home life is recorded. The content is then played in VR to the patient, immersing them back into family life. This is very different from just watching a video or a standard VR experience.

Instructions for friends and family members are provided to assist with the use of the camera.



Family and friends are able to tell stories, say their goodbyes, and the patient. The content is then transferred to the VR headset. The patient is then assisted and able to watch the content

Conclusion

The wellbeing team at Michael Sobell Hospice and Harlington Hospice will continue to develop 'person-centred VR' within the hospice and share learnings both internally and externally.

All VR documentation created is 'open access'. Documents are available in an editable format and can be used by other hospices and those providing end of life care.

The importance and adoption of virtual reality communication will continue to increase. Patients and families will soon expect to be able to communicate using Virtual Reality headsets and within 'the Metaverse'.

It is important that hospices are able to adapt and offer support when new communication technologies are made available.

Personalised VR might become an important service should COVID-19 measures limit the number of hospice guests in the winter months.

Collaborations: Tablets Against Loneliness

“Both Miss T and her husband have advanced dementia. They live in their own home and did not have internet access.

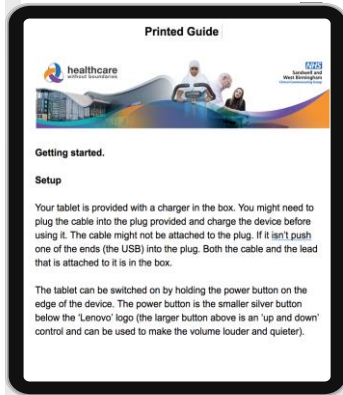
Since receiving a tablet they have been able to have Whatsapp communication and video calls with their daughter who lives in Canada.

Mrs T used to attend Yoga sessions but her now, advanced dementia prevents her from doing so (unable to follow movements).

The tablet provided was used in a ‘case conference’ (review of the support and housing provided by the council). A housing application video call will take place using Zoom (instead of face to face). This will occur from their own home with the support of her daughter.”
